

Prostate Cancer Update

What is Healthwatch?

Healthwatch is here to *demonstrably influence commissioning, service provision or strategic decision making...* and this report outlines how we will achieve this following engagement with the local Bristol community of Black men and their families. Healthwatch will make use of our statutory powers and the information shared with us, to help to set the commissioning agenda for the future, putting local people at the heart of decision-making.

Members of the Bristol Black and Minority Ethnic Community (BAME) came together on Saturday 26 May 2018 for a day of learning about prostate cancer. The day was packed full of information, advice and guidance for local men and their families to come and learn about prostate cancer.

Consultant Urologist from North Bristol NHS Trust, Mr Jon Aning came and supported the day with lots of information and an informative presentation on the latest research into prostate cancer. As a member of the BAME community himself, he mentioned his own family had had experience of prostate cancer.

The charity was giving out various different information resources throughout the day, including booklets specifically aimed at the risks for black men. 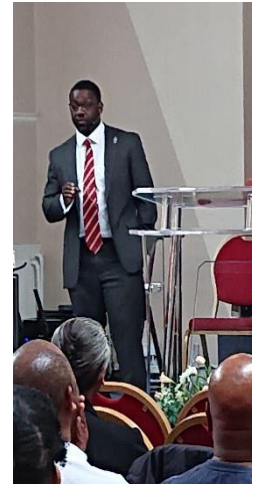

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PROSTATE CANCER UK STATISTICS FROM 2015:

- 47,151 new cases in 2015
- 26% of All new cancer cases in males
- 84% will survive 10 years or more
- 4 in 10 in England are diagnosed at a late stage.

REASONS TO VISIT YOUR GP

- Problems with urination
- Blood in the urine/semen
- Problems with erections
- Discomfort not getting better with painkillers
